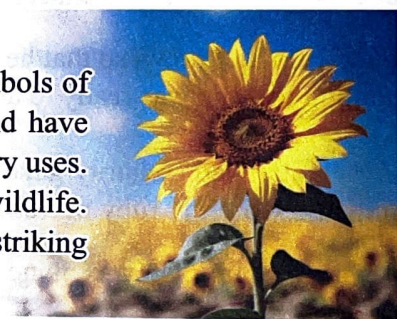
A - ROSES

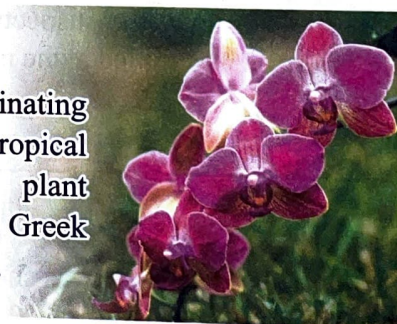
B - SUNFLOWERS

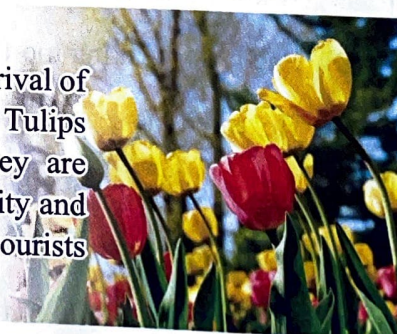
C - ORCHIDS

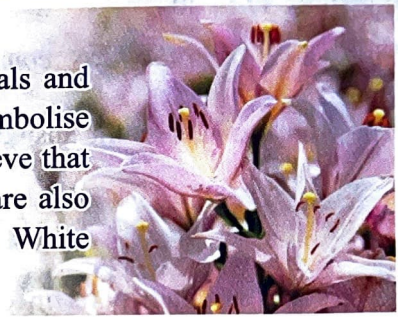
D - TULIPS

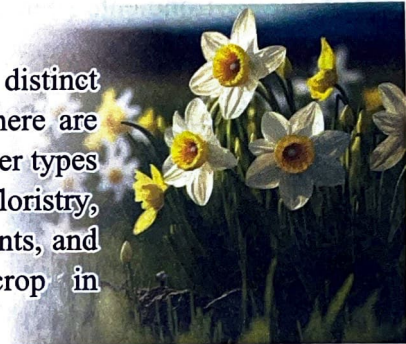


E - LILIES
