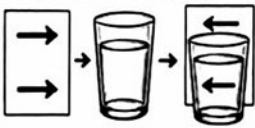

It is the year 2035, and seventeen-year-old Farid is riding his electric motorcycle home from school. As he arrives at his family's wooden house in Baling, Kedah, the front door unlocks automatically as soon as he rides through the gate. The ceiling fans in his living room also switch on independently through motion sensor. How is this possible? That's because Farid and his family live in a rural smart home supported by an intelligent system called "RumAI". The system helps Farid's family control electricity, water, and fuel use in a careful and organised way.

In the near future, smart homes will not only be found in big cities such as Kuala Lumpur or Penang. In many rural areas across Malaysia, families are also living in smart homes. However, these homes are designed differently. They are connected to electricity and clean water supply, but they focus on reducing energy use, saving water, and lowering carbon emissions. The aim is to build a home that is modern, safe, and environmentally friendly.

Farid's house was built with natural cooling in mind. Large windows allow fresh air to flow through the rooms. The roof reflects heat, and the walls are made from materials that keep the indoor temperature stable. Because of this design, the family rarely uses air-conditioning. The system checks both indoor and outdoor conditions before making changes. This reduces electricity use and keeps the home comfortable.

Another feature of RumAI is it can manage the house lighting. During the day, curtains open to let in sunlight. At night, low-energy LED lights are used. If a room is empty for more than ten minutes, the lights switch off automatically. Solar panels on the roof provide extra energy during sunny days. Although the house is connected to the national grid, it depends partly on renewable energy to reduce its carbon footprint.

Water management is another important feature. Rainwater from the roof is collected and stored in tanks. This water is used for gardening and cleaning outdoor areas. RumAI monitors daily water usage. If consumption increases suddenly, the system sends a reminder to the family's phones. This helps them develop responsible habits without feeling stressed.

The smart system also manages appliances in order to make life more convenient and accessible for the family. For example, the washing machine operates automatically when it detects a full load of laundry, especially during off-peak hours when electricity consumption costs less. It is also able to identify when Farid's father's electric car requires recharging. During sunny days, RumAI charges the car using mainly solar energy, and will switch to on-the-grid charging on days with weak sunlight. When travelling, the system also suggests the best time to leave to avoid traffic and tracks the position of the car when GPS location tracking is turned on.

One evening, the true value of the smart home became clear. Farid's grandmother, who is seventy-eight years old, was resting in her room. She wore a small health monitor connected to RumAI. The device tracked her heart rate and movement. Suddenly, the system detected an

irregular heartbeat and noticed that she had not moved for several minutes.

Within seconds, RumAI sent an urgent alert to Farid's parents' phones. The lights in her room switched on automatically, and a calm voice message asked if she needed help. When there was no response, the system contacted the nearest clinic and shared her health data. Farid's father rushed to her room and found her weak but conscious. Thanks to the early warning, medical help arrived quickly. The doctor later explained that the quick response prevented a serious heart attack.

After that night, the family felt even more grateful for their smart home. The system did not only save energy and reduce waste. It also protected the people inside it.

As a result of innovation and careful development, rural smart homes in Malaysia prove that technology can support both sustainability and safety. Families can enjoy comfort while maintaining a low carbon lifestyle. For Farid and his family, their home is more than a building. It is a safe, modern, and convenient place to call home.

WHY RETAIL THERAPY FEELS SO POWERFUL

Shopping has long been associated with pleasure, comfort and even stress relief. In fact, a global study conducted by Deloitte found that nearly 80% of adults across 23 countries admitted to making a purchase simply to lift their mood within the past month. 27. This finding highlights just how widespread emotional spending has become in today's consumer culture.

The term "retail therapy" describes the act of shopping to improve one's emotional state rather than to meet practical needs. 28. Consumer researchers say that spending behaviour is not just about acquiring items. Instead, it is often influenced by hidden emotional triggers that shape how individuals respond to stress, boredom or uncertainty. 29.

Interestingly, the study showed that retail therapy occurs across all income groups. The most frequently chosen splurge category was food and beverages, ahead of fashion and beauty products. 30. Enjoying a special meal or drink can create moments of comfort and connection, particularly after periods of social isolation. Such experiences may help ease feelings of disconnection and loneliness.

The research also challenged assumptions about gender differences in spending behaviour. 31. In fact, when they chose to splurge, men tended to spend significantly more. Some experts explain that this may be because men have fewer socially accepted ways to openly express certain emotions, so shopping becomes a way to meet emotional needs without talking about them.

When asked why consumers make mood-boosting purchases, many mentioned stress relief, self-reward and temporary escape from daily pressures. Although experts caution against excessive debt, taking a small break and treating yourself in moderation can serve psychological functions. 32. Ultimately, retail therapy may not replace professional support but it demonstrates how closely consumption is linked to emotional well-being in modern life.
